Social Farming Newsletter

Year in Review 2021



Our Network passed the milestone of having 100 active social farms in 2021, with farms now available in every county in Ireland. We came close to reaching the level of activity achieved pre-pandemic in 2019 and our small team continue to work hard, keeping the participants at the heart and centre of everything we do. Our Social Farming participants come from an increasingly wide range of sectors. Intellectual disability and mental health services remain the source of the majority of activity but we have seen significant growth in the number of participants and in the levels of interest from the youth, education, homelessness, addiction, eldercare and foster care services where really positive – and in some cases lifechanging – outcomes are being achieved.

We were delighted to have achieved some significant national media coverage in 2021 with slots on RTÉ News and Nationwide and a number of articles about Social Farming published in Agriland. The members of our Social Farming Network are innovators in other areas outside of their Social Farming activity. This year, a number have gained national recognition through being nominated for Farming for Nature Awards, through their biodiversity initiatives or through operating novel enterprises such as raw milk production. No names are needed as we might leave someone out (there are so many!) but anyone who follows us on social media will see what fantastic people our farmers are.

We also had great interest from our elected representatives and were delighted to host a number, on farms and also meet with some. Frank Feighan, Anne Rabbitte, Joe O'Brien, Erin McGreehan, Matt Carthy and Pippa Hackett all had the opportunity to learn more about Social Farming

We continued our very successful collaborations with the Healthy Ireland Programme which enabled participants to access social farming support in 10 counties... we hope this continues to grow in the new programme in 2022.

A brilliant outcome for "S" (and Ciaran)

We are fortunate to be in the space where we have been supporting participants on farms almost continuously since the start of the pandemic. Once we had our Social Farming COVID protocols in place and signed off by the HSE, we were amazed at the willingness of our farmers to adopt new procedures to make their farms safer for participants attending. While the extra administration is a little bit burdensome, it is a small price to pay for supporting our fantastic participants onto farms.

We noticed some changes in the structure of the placements with a lot more 1:1 placements taking place to limit contacts and reduce risk to our participants. We will continue to operate under Social Farming COVID Protocols in line with Government recommendations for the foreseeable future.

On Tommy Earley's Roscommon farm, Tommy and his participant have been hard at work designing and manufacturing a chicken tractor. F has a passion for chickens and travels to poultry shows around the country in search of the perfect bird to improve his flock. Purchasing more fowl means that there is always a shortage of good housing and in an effort to remedy this a new chicken tractor was envisioned! A design was proposed, debated, enhanced and finally agreed and production commenced in November 2020.

After 6 months of sustained effort, a fantastic chicken tractor (tank) was produced. It is fox and predator-proof, has lots of space for hens to graze and scratch to their heart's content, is fully mobile and has some design features to make feeding and watering the birds less of a chore. The carefully crafted nest boxes also offer easy access to the eggs and offer a safe place for the hens to roost overnight.

In 2021 we worked with over twenty organisations with new interest and participants from schools and the youth sector. We continued to build on our core areas of activity of Mental Health Services and Intellectual Disability supports.

Social Farming Stories

This summer, participants from Stafford Day Service, St. Annes were welcomed on Michael O'Connor's farm outside of Nenagh. Activities on the farm included checking on and feeding animals, cleaning out the hen houses, watering, feeding and weeding plants in the polytunnel, and fencing. Michael's sister Katherine was there most days to offer support.

Everybody really enjoyed the placement, really looked forward to going each week and really miss it now that it has finished.

One individual, at the start of the placement, needed verbal and physical prompts to complete tasks, but as their confidence grew during the placement they completed tasks independently.





Michael and Katherine were extremely supportive in assisting with developing a picture schedule for one individual prior to attending each week. Michael would email the task planned for the day and the service so they could devise a picture schedule, allowing the individual to be able to "check off" their activities - knowing that once all task were complete they would happily get to sit on the tractor.

What made this placement special was that everyone looked out for each other and everyone was willing to help. The final personal touch came on the last day when participants were presented with certs and two apple trees were planted in honour of the placement. Great friends and memories have been made and thank you Social Farming Ireland for this opportunity. - Support worker, Stafford Day Service.

We brought 2021 to a close with the completion of a 10-week Social Farming placement in partnership with County Wexford Community Workshop.

Four participants joined us each week to help around the yard participating in daily activities with the horses: collecting from the fields, feeding and grooming, tacking up, and cleaning the stables.

One participant had quite a bit of previous experience around horses and she felt it all coming back to her as the time progressed. The others had less hands-on experience with horses but were used to caring for other animals so took to the tasks like a duck to water.

The weather was favourable most of the time but on the wet days we cleaned tack and organised the tack room - this gave us a chance to explain the purpose and use of each item.



We did some leading exercises at the start of the placement to ensure the participants were confident and competent before we gave them a bit more independent work. We are lucky to have a good selection of ponies and horses which are in retirement or semi-retirement that were perfect for the group. They needed to be brought in to be fed and checked over, so this became a key part of the lads' role over the weeks. And it was clear that both horse and human enjoyed the experience. As the saying goes- "There's something about the outside of a horse that's good for the inside of a man."

Social Farming and Education

Social Farming & The Leaving Cert Applied Programme

On April 27th 2021, we held a hugely successful online information session on Social Farming and the Leaving Cert Applied Programme, attended by staff from 35 schools in 17 counties.

For students, Social Farming provides a real-life learning experience away from the classroom, builds confidence and genuine self-esteem, develops social and practical skills and community connections, all of which happens in the everyday and local setting of the family farm.

Staff from Social Farming Ireland were joined by Elaine Meehan, LCA Coordinator in Carndonagh Community School in Malin Head, by LCA students school Laura and Brendan and by social farmer William McLaughlin, all of whom featured in a case study based on the very positive experience of Social Farming within the school. The information session has really sparked interest amongst participating schools and we have had significantly increased levels of activity since September 2021.

Social Farming & LYIT



Since September 2021, have been collaborating with researchers from Letterkenny Institute of Technology (LYIT) on a two year research project which will involve clinical research on the impacts and benefits of Social Farming for those experiencing mental health challenges. This Project, which has received funding under the prestigious LYIT President's Research Bursaries programme, provides funding for a Masters student to conduct national level research. The Project is supervised by Dr. Gail Cummins (Dept. of Early Education and Social Studies, LYIT), Dr. Louise McBride (Dept. of Nursing and Health Care, LYIT) and Dr. Aisling Moroney (Leitrim Development Company/Social Farming Ireland)



Our work in building connections and developing knowledge of Social Farming amongst third-level academic staff, researchers and students continue. In April, and at the invitation of Prof. Jim Kinsella, Aisling delivered an online seminar on Social Farming to students on the MSc in Sustainable Agriculture and Rural Development, UCD. Seminars to at least three different groups of students within the broad Health and Social Care fields in UCD, UCC and NUIG are taking place in the academic year 2021/2022.

Research & Policy Activity

We are delighted to announce new funding from the Department of Agriculture, Food and the Marine which will enable us to continue our research and modelling work on Social Farming over the next 5 years. As Social Farming continues to grow and develop, it is so important that we retain our ability to evaluate practice, to build the evidence base for Social Farming and most importantly, to progress mainstreaming and full commissioning. The new research/modelling Project is called SoFarMAIN and commenced in autumn 2021: watch this space for further details.

In May, Helen and Aisling were invited to join the monthly on-line learning and networking session of Healthy City and County Co-ordinators to share information on Social Farming.





Aisling worked with SoFI National Project manager Brian Smyth on a joint paper/presentation to the World Down Syndrome Congress 2021 which focused on the benefits of social farming to people with Down Syndrome.



Minister of State at the Department of Children, Equality, Disability, Integration and Youth and at the Department of Health Anne Rabbitte, TD met with Social Farming participants, farmers and service providers on Sean Butlers Roscommon farm. Joining us were representatives from the HSE, and Local Development Companies.
